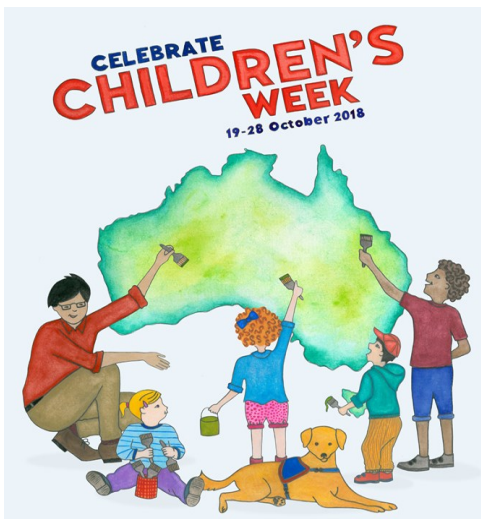
On this day students, parents/caregivers and community members can demonstrate their appreciation of the contributions that teachers have made to their community.

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2018 Student Behaviour Survey

Children and young people's learning is affected by the way they feel about themselves, how they get along with other people and by their physical health. Here at Westbourne Park Primary School, we provide a safe, inclusive, supportive and ordered learning environment that does not tolerate bullying, harassment and violence.

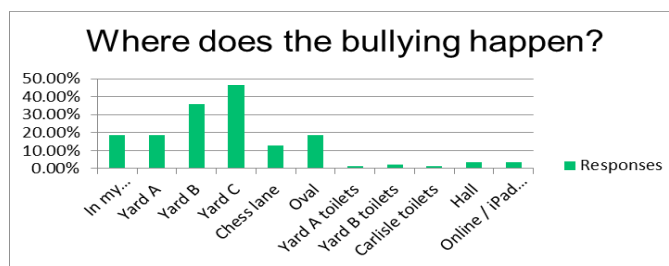
Research shows us that children and young people, who feel that they are treated fairly, cared about and who have a sense of belonging to their home, family and school, tend to be more successful in their learning.

Preschools and schools together with families, have an important role in supporting children and young people's emotional social and physical health. They do this by providing safe and supportive teaching and learning environments, identifying any emotional, social or physical needs early and working to support children and young people with these issues in partnership with families and support services.

Bullying is repeated verbal, physical or social behaviour that is harmful and involves the misuse of power by an individual or group towards one or more persons. Cyber bullying refers to bullying through information and communication technologies.

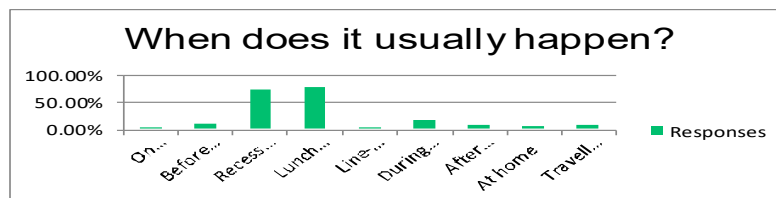
In Term 3 we conducted the bullying survey. Students answered a series of questions about their experiences during the school term.

523 responses were received out of 565 students.



The results showed that 83 students which equals 16% of our R-7 students who responded indicated that they had been bullied.

The inappropriate behaviours ranged from 'Physical bullying' - fighting, hitting, kicking; 'Verbal bullying' - teasing, name calling, being rude; 'Non-verbal bullying' - excluding or leaving a person out of a game.



Of the 16% who indicated that they had been bullied, over half of those students said that the bullying has stopped.

2 students indicated that the bullying was online. Both students alerted their parents/caregivers and the bullying has ceased. Teachers were informed and will follow up with cyber safety.

Class teachers support students who experience friendship issues and discuss with their classes, the effects of bullying and bystander behaviour. They use a variety of educational programs such as, 'The Child Protection Curriculum', 'Program Achieve', 'Bounce Back' and 'Rock and Water', to assist in the development of empathy and understanding about the effects that bullying can have on people. We are proactive with our approach to bullying by using Restorative Practices to ensure that students understand how their behaviours affect, not only the person bullied but those around them.

As teachers and parents/care givers we need to continue to educate our students about what bullying is and how to deal with it, throughout their schooling. The following websites may provide further information which may be useful.

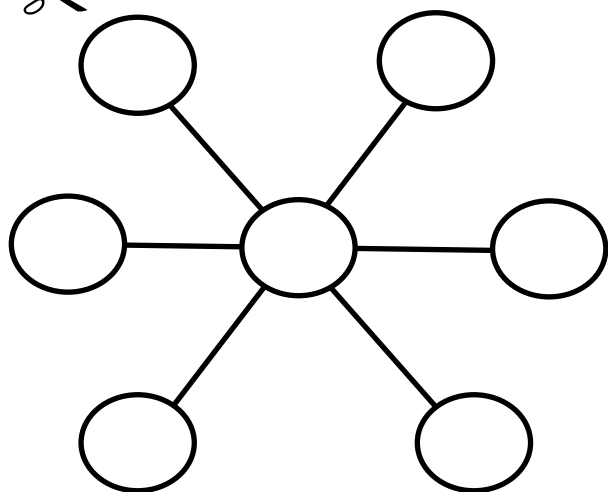
They know that working collaboratively is essential in developing mathematical thinking - maths is not a solo endeavour - collaboration strengthens ideas and enables great breakthroughs.
